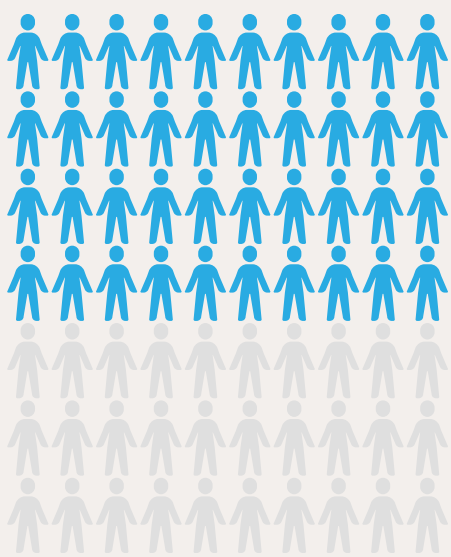




# Placer County

## 2023 Point-in-Time Count



### 709 Individuals Experiencing Homelessness

On January 25, 2023, a minimum of 709 individuals were experiencing homelessness in Placer County. Of those experiencing homelessness, 407 were unsheltered.

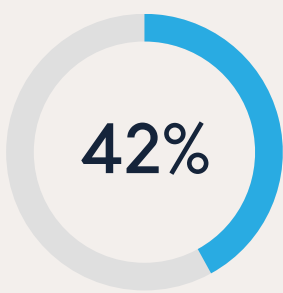
By comparison, the 2022 count surveyed a minimum of 750 individuals experiencing homelessness in Placer County.

## What is the Point-in-Time Count?

A Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a one-night estimate of both sheltered and unsheltered homeless populations. The PIT count provides the number and demographic characteristics of persons who are homeless on the night of the count, both sheltered in emergency shelter or transitional housing; or unsheltered, on the street or in some other place unfit for human habitation, on the night of the count.

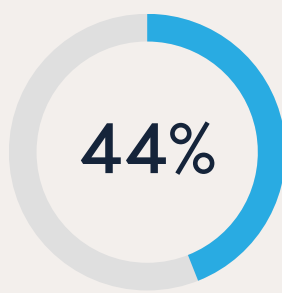


### Substance Use Disorder



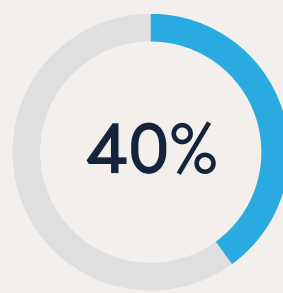
296 individuals self-reported experiencing substance use disorder.

### Physical Disability

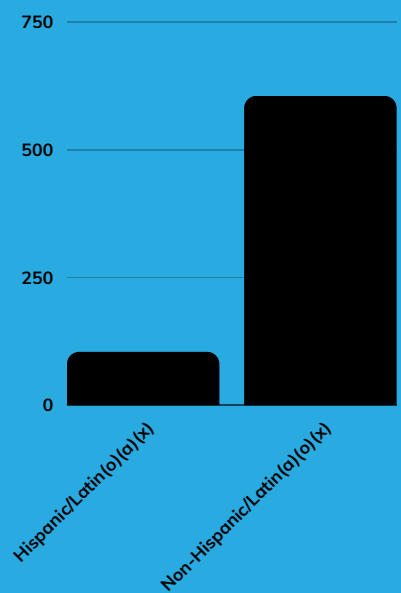
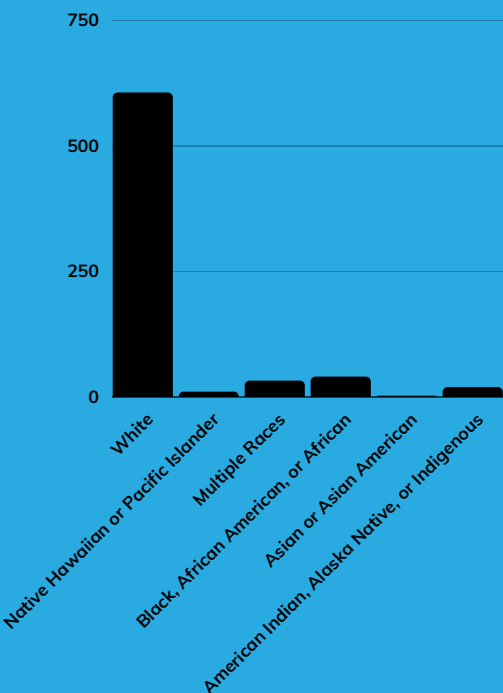


286 individuals self-reported living with a physical disability.

## Race and Ethnicity

The number of individuals who identify as Black, African American, and African and American Indian, Alaska Native, or Indigenous represents 6% and 3% of total people experiencing homelessness despite accounting for 3% and 1% respectively of all people living in poverty in Placer County (1).

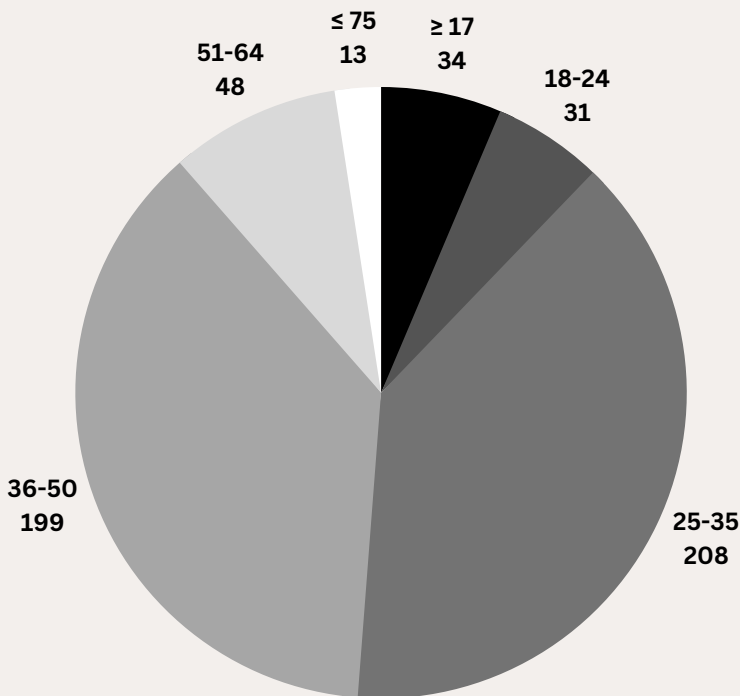

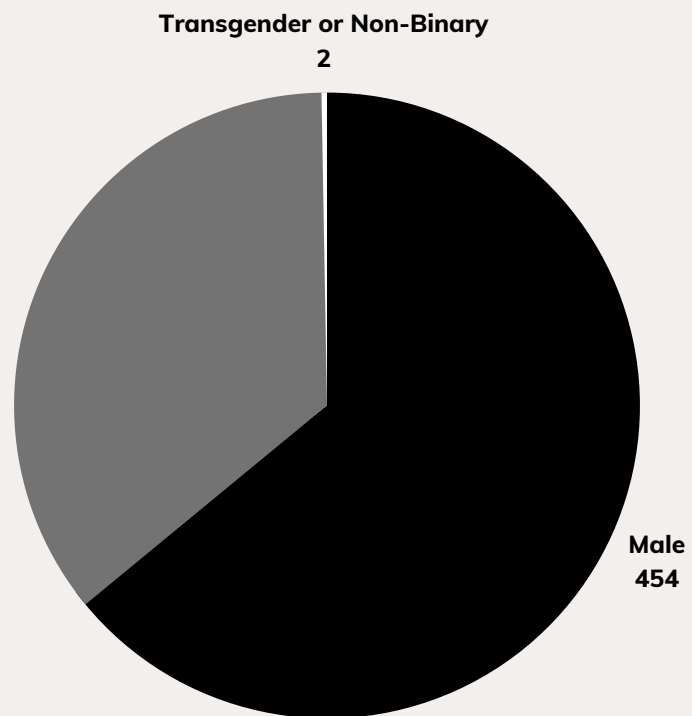

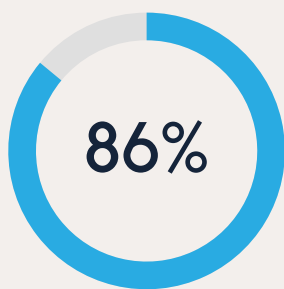

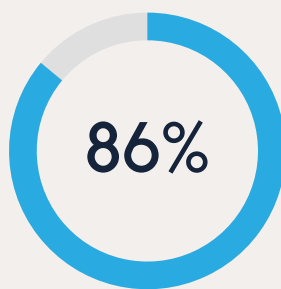
Housing Inventory Count

Emergency Shelter



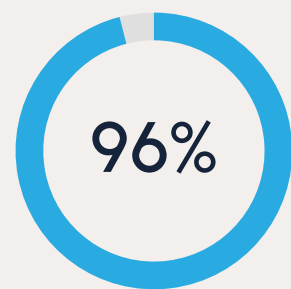
Of the 288 beds across Placer County, 247 were occupied
